After failing piano as a kid because I couldn't read music, I took up folk dancing. I danced for many years, making treasured friends that have lasted a lifetime. Marian Sussman and Beth Kolle are some. I realized I would never be a crack dancer, but thought if I put my passion into a musical instrument, that might be satisfying. I choose the bagpipe because of my Scottish heritage and it was an oral tradition that didn't have those confusing written notes. I started in 1977. Exposure to a Seattle Irish band called No Comhaile in the 70's was life changing. The tradition of playing by ear fit my skills. From there it was a short hop to the Irish harp. I was asked to play before I even knew how. So enter Mary Frank as my harp teacher in 1983. Then a short hop to Pam Vololek and the pedal harp at U of W where I faked my way through music school unable to read a note. Thank you Beth Kolle!! I'm a hybrid musician...traditional, with Salzedo technique. Here is a picture from 1991 when I played with the Scottish band, "Keltoi."

8. Review

John Carrington in a World Premiere By Pat Wooster

On the evening of January 17 I attended a concert of Whidbey Island's Saratoga Orchestra in Langley. Several other members of the Greater Seattle Chapter, AHS, also were there, drawn by the opportunity to hear our own **John Carrington** perform the world premiere of a work for harp and clarinet by Tim Huling. Music Director Anna Edwards directed the 22-member Saratoga Orchestra in four works before a full audience of approximately 250 in Langley's Whidbey Island Center for the Arts. Following the first work, Mendelssohn's *Sinfonie No. 7* in D minor, Maestra Edwards introduced the composer and asked him to provide some background information about his new piece.

Huling, a Pacific Northwest native, currently serves on the faculty of the Berklee School of Music in Boston. He has composed for ballet, orchestra, chamber works, jazz, musical theater, film, and television. His informal and relaxed comments prepared the audience for the upcoming work, first by revealing that his inspiration was Copland's "Appalachian Spring", which was the concluding work on that night's program. Huling wanted to create a work that evokes the Pacific Northwest – hence his title, "The American Northwest". It has 3 movements: I Waters and Waterways; II Bird Calls; III Rainier: The Mountain and Summiting.

All three movements suggest their subjects quite clearly – flowing water, still water, varied bird songs, a series of crescendos representing an ascent of Mount Rainier and finally achieving the summit, with grand strains representing its stupendous views. Featured harpist John Carrington performed effortlessly with clarinetist Jennifer Nelson in their duo passages. Both the harp and clarinet also performed exposed solo passages, with the Saratoga Orchestra maintaining excellent balance throughout. The venue is intimate and well laid out, providing an unobstructed view from any seat, with the result that the audience was fully involved. They loved the piece and gave it a standing ovation. Both John and Jennifer performed flawlessly, bringing out the best in their respective instruments.

This new work is a fine addition to the harp repertoire, to the clarinet repertoire, and to the repertoire for chamber orchestra. It is melodic, representational, and quite accessible. I hope that other orchestras in our region (and throughout the world!) will undertake it in the coming months and years.

Tim Huling remained in the hall after the concert to answer questions, as did John and Jennifer. Jim and I asked both John and Tim to sign our program. (We plan to put it in our safe deposit box and, in a few years cash in at an art auction by accepting an obscenely high bid for this rare document.) John reported that he enjoyed working with Tim during the process of composition, and Tim got the benefit of John's continuing suggestions in producing a work that is harp-friendly and makes the best use of the instrument.

9. Review — Concert Review — Tiffany Chen By Pat Wooster

On the afternoon of Sunday, November 23, 2014, 16-year-old harpist Tiffany Chen, from Vancouver, WA, performed as soloist with the Seattle Youth Symphony Orchestra in Benaroya Hall. Tiffany, an AHS member, gained this honor and opportunity by winning the SYSO's Concerto Competition earlier in the year. Considering that the judges typically are much more familiar with other instruments than with the harp, winning that competition as a harpist competing with string, woodwind, and brass musicians is a remarkable accomplishment.

Tiffany performed Gliere's Concerto for Harp in E-flat Major, Op. 74 She played the

dramatic opening chords with authority, immediately letting her audience know that she was in complete command of the work. Tiffany produced a big, full sound when the piece called for it – a necessity when accompanied by such a large ensemble. She remained focused throughout the work, including an exciting cadenza performance and excellent handling of this piece's many challenging passages. Fittingly, Tiffany was rewarded with a standing ovation from the audience of several hundred.

The third and final work was Rimsky-Korsakov's *Scheherazade*, with Tiffany Chen and fellow harpist **Ellie Yamanaka** sharing its beautiful, prominent harp parts.

Tiffany's teachers and coaches include Valerie Muzzolini Gordon, Pat Wooster, and John Carrington.

NOT SO FUN STUFF

A Harp Cartoon with a Darker Story

From 2002 to 2007 I lived in Hermiston, OR and played with the Oregon East Symphony in Pendleton. The conductor, Kenneth Woods, was an energetic young fellow and fine leader. Around 2006 he married a Welsh woman and commuted to Oregon for a year or two, finally departing to live in Wales. These days Ken conducts Orchestra of the Swan and several others in Britain and is making quite a name for himself.

He began studying the symphonic works of prolific but largely unheard composer Hans Gál (1890-1987), an Austrian Jew who fled to Britain to escape the Nazi horrors and then was incarcerated as an "enemy alien" for a year on the Isle of Man. In recent years Ken and the Orchestra of the Swan recorded all four of Gál's symphonies. You can read more in his blog.

Gál's diary of his year in prison, "Music Behind Barbed Wire: A Diary of Summer 1940" has been translated by his daughter. Both the recordings and book release were celebrated in London on January 19 with readings from the diary and live music from "What a Life," a satirical revue produced by the internees with music by Gál. The cartoon below, dated 1940, was probably made by another of the internees to advertise the show. (The signature looks something like Krumpholz – wouldn't that be an odd coincidence?)





2015 AHS SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION

We are pleased to announce that we will again award local chapter scholarships. The scholarships are open to all AHS member harpists of any age (youth or adult) who are currently studying with an AHS member teacher. Scholarship funds may be used for anything relating to the harp, i.e. tuition, music camps, an instrument, strings, music etc.

Requirements:

- Teacher and student must have become local AHS chapter members by Jan. 1, 2015.
- One page student essay on why you should be considered.
- Teacher letter of recommendation.
- Application, letter and essay must be postmarked (see address below) by May 15, 2015.
 NO EXCEPTIONS.
- Recipient must agree to perform at the 2015 Spring or Fall Chapter meeting.

Current and past AHS board members (excluding any teacher with a student applicant) will select the scholarship recipients and will base their decision on (1) student's level of commitment to the harp, (2) teacher recommendation and (3) financial need.

The number and amount of scholarship awards may vary from year to year depending on available funds and merit of applicants. Scholarship recipient(s) will be notified by May 25, 2015. ALL DECISIONS ARE FINAL.
